Long Arm Service: Defendant lives out of state

Make sure you request service by long arm in your pleadings if the defendant is out of state. Notice/service is a <u>due</u> process issue and must be correctly executed. Upon filing the petition with the Clerk of Court, request an additional certified copy for your defendant. **IMPORTANT:** It's your responsibility to send the documents to the defendant! You must send the documents to the defendant via U.S. mail or a commercial courier like UPS or FedEx The courier will send you notice that your package was signed and delivered ("the green card"). Once you get the return, complete the <u>Affidavit</u> of Long Arm Service, have it notarized, and file it into the record with the return-slip attached IMPORTANT! Your hearing date cannot conflict with For divorces, you defendant's due process have to wait 30 For hearing matters, you have rights.
